Last Day of School for Students in 2017 Dear Parents, Carers, Students & Friends,

It's never too late to be punctual! There has been an improvement in the attendance of children at school; with less children arriving late each day. Nevertheless to help our families even more, here are some thoughts on being punctual....

Does your family start the day with repeated orders and pleading to various members to get up, get dressed, have their breakfast, pack their school bag, brush their teeth, catch the bus?

Some children are always late – to school, to classes, with projects – and the chaos of their lives has an effect on their ability to learn. A calm, well-organised start to the day and successful time management help develop the habits that lead to good learning.

Effective time management leads to greater contentment. Satisfaction with how we use our time is an important predictor of happiness. Time is the basis on which we operate our lives and if we're happy with the way we manage time, we're happy with our lives. Being late is a way of life for many people. But good timekeeping can be learnt.

For some, lateness is the only way they can get anything done. They have convinced themselves that racing to the deadline is the way they work best, and leave everything to the last minute to get that adrenaline rush that charges them up to get the job done. They usually never count the cost of the worry, feelings of panic and lying awake at night as the deadline looms and they haven't yet started.

How can you change these habits? Help the unpunctual members of your family take responsibility for their own lateness. It pays to begin when they are young but it's never too late to start. Set their alarms, establish routines like who is first to use the bathroom, have breakfast ready and expect them to be out the door on time.

One unpunctual member of the family can raise the stress levels for everyone. Being left behind just once is often all that it takes to change habitual lateness.

Here are some other ideas to try:

- Try 'To Do' lists and learn to enjoy ticking off each task as it is done.
- Keep a detailed calendar and a checklist for progress.
- Regard lack of punctuality as lack of manners. People who always keep others waiting regard themselves as far more important. They are sending a clear message that your time is not as important as theirs.
- Most lateness 'junkies' have developed ways of distinguishing 'important' appointments from those
 they think don't matter so much. They feel in their own minds that they are on time for the things that
 matter to them and selfishly ignore the effect on others who are kept waiting.
- It is nonsense to convince yourself that you work best when you are under pressure. That really is no more than an excuse for time-wasting and refusing to get organised.
- To feel more in control of your time, take note of when you are late and by how much. It's often a standard amount and conforms to a pattern. Often you can be punctual by giving yourself a margin of only ten minutes to get to the school gates, to work and to meet friends.

THE CHURCH'S LITURGICAL SEASONS

Just as we mark our lives by anniversaries, the Church celebrates the mysteries of Christ's life in a pattern. Within the cycle of a year the Church remembers and celebrates the Paschal Mystery, the birth, life, suffering, death, Resurrection and Ascension of Jesus. The Church's liturgical cycle recalls the Paschal Mystery over a yearly cycle. At mass, we also remember the Paschal Mystery and are constantly nourished by the story of Jesus and the body and blood of Jesus in the Eucharist.

The seasons are Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter. Apart from these seasons, there are 33 or 34 weeks of the year that do not celebrate a particular aspect of the mystery of Christ but are devoted to the mystery of Christ in all its aspects. This period of the Church calendar is called Ordinary Time, which is the period we are now in. The liturgical colour for Ordinary Time is **green**.

The children in Year 4 who are preparing to celebrate their First Eucharist on Sunday 18th & 25th June, can point out the items in the Church that are coloured to reflect the season of the church. The students can also explain why the priest's chasuble is a different colour.

MID YEAR (SEMESTER 1) REPORTS

Reports for the first semester of the year were distributed on Tuesday. The report format meets the Federal Government and Parramatta Diocesan requirements. All children in Years 1-6 are graded using a five grade scale - A,B,C,D,E, the scale summarising the standard (or quality) of achievement. This scale was developed to give parents insight into how well their child has achieved at the subjects studies by describing the depth of knowledge and understand as well as the range of skills. Teachers decide which grade best matches the standard your child has achieved based on many pieces of work, assessments, and observations.

Children in Kindergarten are not graded using an A-E scale, but rather by their own level of development over the first year at school. Students in Kindergarten received a report where the level of achievement is reported using the following scale:

Working Beyond	The student has a thorough knowledge and understanding of the content and a high level of competence in the processes and skills. In addition, the student is able to apply this knowledge and these skills in most situations.	
Achieved	The student has a sound knowledge and understanding of the main areas of content and has achieved an adequate level of competence in the processes and skills.	
Working Towards	The student has a basic knowledge and understanding of the content and has achieved a limited level or competence in the processes and skills.	
Experiencing Difficulty	The student has an elementary knowledge and understanding in few areas of the content and has achieved very limited competence in some of the processes and skills.	

At Our Lady of the Way we have developed high expectations for our students' learning. While looking at your child's report, remember to refer to the statements of achievement that describe your child's level of success in each Key Learning Area. Also remember to pay attention to your child's work habits.

Should you have any questions or concerns about your child's report, please discuss this with your child's class teachers.

PARENT TEACHER STUDENT LED CONFERENCES

Parent, Teacher & Student Conferences will be held between 19th-30th June. On-line bookings through the School Interviews Online site http://www.schoolinterviews.com.au (Code: xutbc) close on Saturday 17th June. Please call the office to make a booking after this date. All parents and their children are invited to meet with their teachers - this is a significant event!

We regularly talk with the children about the need to work and learn as much as they can each day and never settling for anything less than their best. A great sayings is to 'Raise the Bar' – in other words, once we achieve something we need to set a new goal that raises the bar just a little – improving each time we attempt something, challenge ourselves to do better and not to become complacent.

Do you challenge your children from time to time to extend themselves? Do you make your children feel a little uncomfortable because the demands on them are more than they are used to? Every child needs to be challenged if they are to learn the extent of their abilities.

As parents we are protectors, supporters and teachers for our kids...but we also need to be challengers so they can see for themselves their real capabilities.

This term let us all take on the challenge to raise the bar of our children's learning so that the successes shared at the student led conferences will be a celebration of some great achievements.

TEACHERS ARE LEARNERS TOO

Over the past week our staff have been engaged in many hours of professional learning including a 2-hour Writing Twilight with the staff of St Finbar's and St Nicholas of Myra. They have also participated in a 2-hour Multiplicative Thinking course. The professional conversation and learning that took place was amazing! Our staff are certainly committed to learning.

MATHEMATICS IN TODAY'S CLASSROOM

In today's classroom, a quiet maths lesson is a cause for concern. Talk is an important part of children's learning, as it gives them the opportunity to communicate their thinking and talk through the problem-solving process.

Children who come from homes where reading and talking about reading is common place, are more likely to be successful in literacy throughout their lives. The same is true for maths, "the more maths and numbers there are around a child, the more likely they're going to like maths and enjoy maths and develop as mathematicians" (Geist, 2009).

As your child grows, so can the maths talks that you have with them. Maths talk is simply talking to your child about the maths that they experience, either in the classroom or in other aspects of their lives.

Parents can include maths talks to their child's everyday experiences. For example, if we add four more children to your birthday party list, how many children will there be? How many sweets should we put in each bag to make sure they are equal? Allow your child to have think time, discuss the problem with you or their sibling and then work out an answer. The main purpose is to participate in friendly discussion over interesting mathematical ideas and concepts. The correct answer is not as important as the process of getting there. Give your child the opportunity to talk through the maths and show you their reasoning.

Being quiet, respectful and listening to your child is sometimes more helpful than offering endless assistance.


I would ask all those families seeking enrolment for next year to return their enrolment forms as soon as possible so that an interview can be organised.

At Our Lady of the Way, we continue to promote student attendance – EVERY LEARNER, EVERY DAY. Student time on task is important to learning. Every day your child is out of school, for whatever reason, their learning achievement suffers. (To 14th June) OLOW Attendance Level was:

At OLOW, we are focusing closely on regular [daily] and timely [arrival on time] attendance of all students. Our challenge is to meet a minimum target of 90% attendance every day. However, 100% is the ideal. It is great to know that we have so many families who try to ensure their children attend school every day. Congratulations to every grade for reaching above the CEDP minimum target of 90%.

Absence Explanation Note: If your child is away from school, a note explaining their absence is required within 7 days of returning to school. If no note is received the absence is recorded as 'unexplained'. Parents can use the Skoolbag app to email an absence note to school.




