QUALITY CATHOLIC SCHOOLING (QCS) SURVEY.

Our Lady of the Way will be once again participating in the Quality Catholic Schooling survey. The QCS survey provides information from students, staff and parents about our school's cultural behaviour, relationships and learning community, and assists us in our focus on continuous improvement.

Between **21 March and 1 April 2016** all staff, all Year 5 & 6 students, and 60 randomly selected parents will be asked to complete an online survey. Staff and students will complete the survey online at school. Parents will be sent home a paper survey but will also be able to complete the survey online if preferred. The survey will take about 20-30 minutes to complete.

An independent survey consultant (*Insight SRC*) who manages the data collection will ensure the survey data is kept strictly confidential. Our school will receive an information report at the end of May to help us to develop strategies for further improvement.

As a parent, if you are randomly-selected to complete the survey, I would encourage your participation as this will help our school to identify our strengths and areas in which we can focus our improvement.



SOCIAL JUSTICE

At OLOW, we place a strong emphasis on social justice experiences. They are learning experiences, not just fundraising, as this deepens the children's knowledge and understanding of social justice. Some examples of our social justice initiatives include:

Project Compassion, Diocesan Works Fund, the Winter Food Appeal for the Penrith Community Kitchen, and making up hampers for the Vinnies Christmas Appeal are some of the practical ways our school community displays a sense of social justice and cares for those in greatest need within our local and worldwide community. We also have close ties with the local chapter of the St Vincent de Paul Society and Mama Lana's Community Foundation.

Each year we have a strong interaction with and support of Caritas Australia, which includes inviting guest speakers who help deepen the children's knowledge and understanding of the needy in our world.

We strongly believe that social justice begins at home as we strive to: Act Justly, Love Tenderly and Walk Humbly with our God. In this way we are conscious of social justice being ever present in the way we do things within our own community in order to model this concept for the children and to engage them in it. A concerted effort is made to reach out and care for families and children within our own school who are in the greatest need of support and compassion.

EXTRA CURRICULA OPPORTUNITIES

Extra Curricula opportunities at Our Lady of the Way, are based on the student's interest, their commitment to train or rehearse as well as their behaviour. Extra Curricula opportunities are 'extra' and therefore are a privileged event. These are privileged events because the students are representing our school, students require self-regulation and trust to be in different environments and with other students, teachers and parents to be safe, responsible ambassadors. The school receives regular feedback about how well-mannered our students are to each other and others. During the year OLOW students will have



many opportunities to participate in extra curricula activities and I wish to thank the staff for their tireless effort placed on each activity. This year we will have representatives in swimming, netball, soccer, gymnastics, touch football, athletics and basketball. Students at OLOW have the opportunity to be part of the Dance Fever Interschool Challenge. Our choir has also been invited to take part in the larger CAPTIVATE choir.



CATHOLIC CULTURE

PARKING MATTERS

It has been brought to our attention that parents/carers/grandparents are misusing the "No Stopping Zone". A few cars are consistently parking in the "No Stopping Zone" and blocking the vision of drivers near the pedestrian crossings. We have asked the police to do some additional patrols, as we don't want any of our community injured.

Our neighbours are also complaining that parents are parking in and across their drive-ways. The school and parish asks you to

park appropriately, thoughtfully and safely at all times.

PARKING IN CHAMBERS CELLARS CARPARK

Please do not park in the *Chamber Cellars* carpark if you are not shopping there and only visiting the school. The proprietor rang the school last Thursday very upset. If you wish to make an arrangement with him to park in the afternoon, do so directly with the owner as a matter of courtesy. It is unpleasant for the office staff to receive phone calls from unhappy community members.

STUDENT PICK UP IN THE AFTERNOON

Students must not be walking unaccompanied through the staff carpark and church grounds or any other area on the parish site. All children should be collected in person and accompanied and supervised closely by parents/guardians to motor vehicles.

THIS IS A SAFETY ISSUE AS THERE IS A HIGH VOLUME OF VEHICLE TRAFFIC IN THE AFTERNOON.

Whilst this may be slightly inconvenient, it is far better than jeopardising the safety and well-being of our students.

OLOW BUILDING PROJECT



We are very thankful to the State Government and the Catholic Education Office for their assistance in updating the facilities at Our Lady of the Way. The new facilities will assist with access to the site and open up the existing grounds so they

can be utilised by the school community.

The Hon Stuart Ayres MP for Penrith presented the school with a cheque for \$291,735 last week for the construction of a new administration building and playground area.



The State Government provides Catholic and Independent schools in NSW the opportunity to apply for a grant each year to help with building projects.

"The \$416,765 project will include \$291,735 provided under the NSW Government's Building Grants Assistance Scheme (BGAS) with the remainder funded by the Catholic Education, Diocese of Parramatta," Mr Ayres said.

The building process is well under way and has gone out to tender last week. You can view the plans at our upcoming P&F meeting.

NAPLAN TESTING 2016

National Assessment Program for Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) testing will be conducted from 10 - 13 May 2016 for all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 across Australia. These national tests will provide information on how Australian students are performing in the areas of numeracy, reading, writing, spelling, grammar and punctuation and will assist teachers in identifying student strengths and weaknesses. By analysing results along with information from teacher judgements and work samples, teachers can adjust teaching strategies to provide appropriate support. The aggregation of student results from the NAPLAN provides schools with an overview of current achievements for groups of students and contributes to a more comprehensive understanding of their performance. The analysis of aggregated results assists school planning and can be used to monitor literacy and numeracy development over time.

Meet Sreymom...



Sreymom lives in Northeast Cambodia where extreme poverty has meant that many people have health issues. She is a midwife and uses her skills to assist many women in surrounding villages. The Caritas supported Mondulkiri Community Health Program has provided her with further training to help many women in local communities.

She said: "It is very important to share knowledge with others... It is useful to the community and this sharing will increase the villagers' knowledge on children's health care."

Meet Dhaniram...



Dhaniram lives in Central India where for generations the tribes people have been discriminated against. Caritas ran a program called 'Hamara Haq' ('Our Rights') which gave Dhaniram information about working for the human rights of his people. Through his efforts the 84 houses in the village now have electricity.

"I am passionate because I feel that this village is mine and we all should live a good life," Dhaniram tells. "We are now empowered to speak up and ask for our rights."

Thank you so much for encouraging your children to take part in our Silly Sock day to support Caritas and Project Compassion. The Outreach Team put so much effort into making the tokens and helping the children



to create our 'giant 50' in recognition of the 50th anniversary of Project Compassion. The children helped to raise \$333. A great effort!

The Outreach Team has challenged us to raise \$700 by the end of Lent. We are hoping that the money raised through our 'Harmony Day' donations and the children's personal donations will help us to reach this goal. Money raised by Project Compassion has helped to make so many wonderful changes in the lives of people around the world.



Doors of Mercy:

In important years of Jubilee, the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica is opened. In this year of Mercy we consider the door to be a Holy Door of Mercy where all who enter will receive grace and forgiveness. You may have noticed that Our Lady of the Way also has many 'MERCY' doors.

We learned so many new things that we reported back to the class the next day. We all had a really great time and our favourite part was the loud noises!
