Dear Parents, Carers, Students & Friends,

Last Sunday we celebrated one of the great festivals of the Church. It is not nearly as well-known as Christmas or Easter, but for Christians it is profoundly significant. Christianity didn't start with Jesus' birth, his death or even his ascension into heaven. It started with Pentecost. It marks the coming of the Holy Spirit on the disciples and their transformation from frightened and confused people to men who would face martyrdom for what they believed. This is the event that makes the church...the church!



Pentecost is from the Greek meaning 'fifty'. It is the 50th day after Easter. It is also referred to as the 'birthday of the church' and marks the beginning of Christianity as a purposeful movement and a new community. The scripture readings for this event proclaim the coming of the Holy Spirit, which changed everything. It filled the original followers of Jesus with spiritual gifts that transformed them from timid individuals to people who were prepared to get up and go forward with love and courage to serve. This same Holy Spirit has been breathed into us at birth and is strengthened sacramentally through our lives.

The challenge for us as modern day Catholics is working out how to bring our faith to life in our homes. It is one thing for children to learn what the gifts of the Holy Spirit are, but it is quite another thing to have the children understand and recognise the gifts in themselves. It is our job to help them!

For this we can rely on the Gifts of the Spirit – Wisdom, Knowledge, Courage, Understanding, Right Judgement, Reverence, Awe and Wonder to discern what is true, good and important in our lives.

OLOW WINTER UNIFORM

PHOTO DAY

TOMORROW - PUPIL FREE DAY (But not for the staff)

The upcoming staff development day on Friday will be on Mathematics and furthering our professional development around effective numeracy teaching. We will be focusing on the use of mental strategies in line with our 2015 numeracy goal.

EXTENDING MATHEMATICAL UNDERSTANDING (EMU for short)

One of our school learning goals this year is for every student to apply efficient mental computation strategies. The school is supported towards the achievement of this goal through a Diocesan initiative called Extending Mathematical Understanding (EMU). This research-based learning and teaching approach is not a program but relies on obtaining quality student data about numeracy understanding through an annual one-to-one interview conducted with each child by the grade teacher. The information gained from this interview is then used to inform teaching and measure student progress.

At the beginning of this year every student underwent a Mathematical Assessment Interview (MAI). Our teacher learning in numeracy continues to focus on implementing specific whole school strategies, which includes warm up activities and rich tasks. This approach has shown to have the most effect on student numeracy acquisition. The team leading this initiative in our school comprises Mrs Kakoschke as lead numeracy teacher, Mrs Flanagan and Mrs Kuipers as Numeracy Specialist Teachers and Mr Mifsud, who supports students throughout the school.

OLOW ATHLETICS CARNIVAL



A day like this needs a lot of support for it to run smoothly, so if you are free to help out we would be most grateful. In case it rains, our backup day is Tuesday 23rd June.

HALF YEARLY REPORTS

I have had the pleasure of reading your children's reports this week. I just wanted to acknowledge the professionalism, time and effort the staff have used in analysing work samples to grade the subject areas and composing report comments.

Your child's Half Yearly Report will be sent home on **Friday 12 June**. This year OLOW will be using the CEDP's new 'FACES' report for Years 1-6 based on the A-E scale. Kindergarten will be receiving a criterion report based on skills/indicators of success.

It is always very easy to focus on the grades received. And while these are important, we need to look beyond these and celebrate the whole child. There are so many special qualities that a child has that cannot be graded and recorded on a school report. One of the best measures we have as parents is not something that can be graded as A, B, C, D or E – it is in fact, our child's personal growth, their happiness at coming to school and their willingness to persevere. These behaviours show learning attitude, the ability to engage with their learning and experiences here at school. If a child is truly eager about their learning they will keep giving their very best, whatever grades they receive. Yes, as parents we want our children to do the very best but a 'personal best' is not always something that can be measured.



PARENT/TEACHER/STUDENT LED CONFERENCES

Our Parent, Teacher and Student Conferences will take place in Weeks 9 & 10 (15 June – 26 June). A booking information sheet will be sent home on Monday 1st June. Interview times will be available through our booking app on Tuesday 2nd June from 6pm. Each interview will be allocated 15 minutes where your child will explain the goals they have been working on and the progress they have made this semester. If

you have other concerns that you would like to discuss with your child's teacher of a more personal nature, please make another interview time.

LEARNING NEWS

YEAR 1 FIZZICS INCURSION

Year One recently had an Incursion from Fizzics Education called "Little Life". They learnt all about insects and other small animals and how they grow and change. Here are some highlights from the session.

Jake:

I saw a stick insect and I saw a leaf insect. I saw a horn bug, it was awesome. He had a sharp horn.

Miah:

I went to a table with the dirt. We got a bowl and tweezers so that we could look for tiny creatures. I found a middle-sized centipede and ten worms. When I put the centipede under the microscope it looked bigger than normal.

Maya:

I did the picture of a spider because it is my favourite. Next I looked at a picture of a skeleton. After that I looked at my skin on the computer.



Mia:

I went to look in the dirt because I wanted to see little insects. I saw a tiny centipede. They were too fast so I got a worm and I put it under the magnifying glass. When I put it in the magnifying glass it was huge.

Aidan:

Today Year One had an incursion. There was a stick insect and a tree trunk. We got to look at the pictures.

Zac:

We played games like finding bugs and insects. I caught a worm. Then another worm. Next we swapped rotations. We did footprints. I made a chicken footprint.



SRC'S WAY

This term we have had some more successful meetings with all of the students in our school. The grades have had some very creative ideas. The Year 6 SRC representatives have listened to the different ideas from the grades and the things we talked and asked the students about were the Strengths, Challenges and So What?

If you are wondering why we are asking about the Strengths, the purpose of it is to find and collect feedback from the students' point of view. The main strengths that the students came up with are: that they have many places to play, including grass areas and concrete areas (and now students and teachers are running activities during our breaks). There is great ANZAC wall to show our respect for those who have served our nation. They also love the new and improved soap dispensers. These are just a few of the strengths that the students shared, there are a lot more.

In the meetings, after we talk about Strengths we talk about the Challenges because as the SRC representatives we are here to listen to the students to help improve the school. Some of the challenges that came up in most of the meetings were that they would like to have more shade on the back and cottage playgrounds. Having water on the back and cottage playground and freshly painted lines on the handball courts are other ones. The thing is, we have plans for these issues.

The rest of the meeting we talked about the So What? Which is what can we do about it. The reason we do this is to help us. We need an idea on how we as students of the school can all contribute to help. Some of the ideas the students had were: raise money for the school, fundraisers (like a paper plane competition, colouring competition, have running races, have a BBQ and have more school fetes). There will also be many more creative and fun ideas on how we can help.

Term 2 has been very successful with the SRC helping the school learn and grow in all the best ways. We are very excited to take these ideas from the students and use them to make the school better.

GRIP LEADERSHIP DAY

On Wednesday the 20th of May the four school captains visited Olympic Park for a Leadership Conference. The conference was all about developing new leadership skills and making a difference to our school.

Some people may think that GRIP stands for Gorilla's Really Interest People but, it actually stands for Generosity, Responsibility, Integrity and People.

We did lots of different activities which let us meet and make new friends from different schools, which we now are going to share with the rest of the SRC. They also taught us many different leadership skills which we can use to teach all the members of our school. We learnt how to use our time, treasures and talents for generosity. 


HOME READING

Parents often ask about the best way to help with reading at home. The following are some useful prompts to use that mirror what happens at school.

You might also like print out and cut out the 'Stuck on a tricky word?' card to use as a bookmark. You can find it on the next page.



SOME USEFUL READING PROMPTS:



- Look at the picture. Can it help you? (e.g. What is the bird doing? Where is it?)
- Get your mouth ready with the 1st sound in the word. (e.g. The bird is on the t___)
- Think of what word would make sense that starts with that letter. (e.g. tiny? tree?)
- Still stuck? Look for chunks in the word that might help you read it. (e.g. tr-ee)
- Try skipping over the hard word and reading to the end of the sentence. Now go back and reread. Keep thinking about what word would make sense in that sentence. (e.g. The bird is on the t__ in a nest.)
- When you think you know what the tricky word is, crosscheck your reading by thinking: **1 Does it make sense? 2 Does it look right? 3 Does it sound right?**



SOME EXAMPLES

Get your lips ready- e.g. Ben can cat__ the big red ball. (1st part of word and reading on. May then be enough information to predict the whole word.)

Stretch it out- e.g. r-e-d / red

Chunk the word- e.g. c-at-ch / cat-ch / catch

Skip it, hop back- e.g. Ben can ____ the big red ball. (Leave out the tricky word. Read on to end. Go back to the start of the sentence and try again with more meaning known.)

Flip the vowel- Vowels (a e i o u) can be said different ways. Sometimes the student will need to try more than one way of saying the vowel within a word, before he or she can hear a word that would make sense, e.g. **a** can have the short sound like it has in **catch** or it can have a long sound like it has in **made**.

GENERAL NEWS

BUILDING HEALTHY HABITS

Children are learning habits that will often last them a lifetime. Consider the following:

- Breakfast is important. Children who eat breakfast have better concentration. Eating breakfast can reduce snacking on high-energy foods in the afternoon in both adults and children.
- Be realistic about the size of the serve you offer children. Forcing children to finish what is on their plate when they are not hungry may lead to overeating and/or strong food dislikes.
- Avoid giving children processed snack foods high in sugar. Encourage brushing teeth in the morning and before bed to develop good dental habits.





