

Individual Plans Data Collection

Across the Diocese of Parramatta, all staff have been working together to clarify the standards for Education under the Disability Discrimination Act and our response within each school environment. The Catholic Education Commission has taken an active role in collecting information across Australia and their central aim is to help each child "to experience their possibilities". This means that the CEC will be

- collecting comparable information about the diversity of the population of students with disability and the level of adjustments that are provided for them this is a much bigger group than previously.
- working directly with the Federal Government to ensure the distribution of funding potentially reaches an agreed disability loading across all sectors of education.
- helping us to meet the needs of all students with regard to equity, diversity and inclusion of all children.
- Enabling the Federal government to measure the participation, progress and attainment of students with disability against
 national standards and enable education authorities to examine the factors which may impact on the education of students with
 disability.

Becoming Resilient Learners

Developing virtues or character strengths is of crucial importance in helping children enjoy learning and become proficient in it. Self-value, self-awareness and self-discipline all impact on an individual's learning resilience.

Self-value: Children need to be valued and capable if they are to be successful in their lives. Praise and appreciation is a key part and can communicate very effectively that an individual is valued. Unregulated or inauthentic praise, however, can be detrimental to long-term development as it lacks the solid foundation of tried and tested competency. It is important that children be given the opportunity to try, and fail, and try again so that they can build a sense of self-value based on competency rather than unearned praise.

Self-awareness: It is important for students to know their strengths and weaknesses so that they can plan around them. Self-awareness helps a person to read their body and mind so that they can respond appropriately when under stress or at their peak. Symptoms indicating that their body or mind is hungry, fatigued or sluggish need to be recognised so that they know when to take a break. Similarly, recognising when they are most alert and energised can help them plan to use that time for important study rather than recreation. Understanding what motivates them can help students to manage the fluctuations in their enthusiasm.

Self-discipline: Success in any endeavour takes focused and often sustained effort. Feelings such as tiredness, boredom, impatience, frustration and discouragement can thwart a person's desire to succeed. Students who develop mastery over such feelings will accomplish their academic and life goals with greater ease.

As parents and teachers we work together to create circumstances in which our children can develop self-value, self-awareness and self-discipline.



Purposeful Talk

We all need time to talk so that we can:

- Process our thinking
- Connect to the topic
- Engage through participation
- Build new ideas and create new understandings

Purposeful Talk is one of the main ways children develop their understandings of new concepts. New ideas and connections are triggered through opportunities to:

- Talk
- Question
- Discuss
- Clarify

Purposeful Talk supports these aims by developing student knowledge, understanding and skills in order to:


- Communicate through speaking and listening

Through **Purposeful Talk** students will value and appreciate:

- The power of language to explore and express views
- The power of effective communication
- The role of language in developing positive interaction and cooperation with others

In working with the English Syllabus teachers will support students to be able to:

- Demonstrate active listening
- Follow instructions
- Ask relevant questions
- Respond constructively to different opinions
- Communicate clearly and purposefully with others to express well-developed and well-organised ideas
- Understand how people use language for different purposes
- Deliver effective presentations
- Collaborate with others to share and evaluate ideas and opinions



In the Learning Space:

Purposeful Talk takes place throughout each day across all Key Learning Areas. Students are engaged in learning opportunities where they will:

- Listen to one another and share ideas
- Engage in purposeful talk before, during and after reading and writing activities
- Consider and evaluate alternative viewpoints
- Plan, rehearse and deliver presentations
- Justify personal opinions and negotiate with others

At home:

You can support the work being done in the Learning Space by:

- Looking for meaningful opportunities to talk with your child (if your first language is not English then it is important to talk to your child in your first language)
- Reading to your child regularly (discuss the characters, setting and any changes that occur in the story)
- Giving your child opportunities to ask lots of questions
- Discussing meaningful situations and events (encourage your child to offer opinions and clarify understandings)
