

# Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta Student Attendance Guidelines -Every Day Counts-

The CEDP Attendance Guidelines are based on current legislative requirements, research on attendance and best practice. The key points are:

- ✓ Attendance affects a child's academic achievement and their overall wellbeing.
- ✓ There is NO safe threshold of absence every day counts.
- ✓ School attendance patterns are established early in a child's schooling research shows Year 1 attendance is a predictor of future attendance patterns.
- ✓ The effects of school absenteeism accumulate over time and affect children's development now and into the future.
- ✓ Daily punctuality is important. The early part of each day is critical. Important learning is scheduled during this time when children are rested and receptive. Key concepts are built up in the time.
- ✓ Sporadic absences can affect academic achievement as much as absences over consecutive days.
- ✓ We ALL need to work together with our children's best interest in mind to ensure that students are at school every day that they are well enough to attend – they only get one go at this part of their education and every day counts.

Below is a table showing the thresholds established across the Diocese for student attendance and the accumulated effects over 10 years of school time lost.

Attendance Rate	Student Absence	Educational Risk	Days absent per year	Cumulative Absence over 10 years of school
90% or more	Regular	Low or zero	20 days or less	Adds up to 1 year or less schooling missed
80%-89%	Emerging	Medium	Between 20-40 days	Adds up to 1-2 years schooling missed
70%-79%	Chronic	High	Between 40-60 days	Adds up to 2-3 years schooling missed
69% or lower	Complex	Severe	60 or more days	Adds up to 3 years plus schooling missed

### 2016 MATHEMATICS TESTING JANUARY

As was introduced in January this year, all students will be assessed using the **Maths Assessment Interview** on **Wednesday 27<sup>th</sup> and Thursday 28<sup>th</sup> January 2016**. Our Lady of the Way staff will be taking two Staff Development Days to assess students in Years 1-6. This is a one-on-one interview style assessment led by a teacher. Each assessment takes a minimum of 30 minutes. More details and an interview on-line booking schedule will be organised for later this term. **School will resume for students in Years 1-6 on Friday 29<sup>th</sup> January 2016**.

Kindergarten students will have a separate testing schedule for literacy and numeracy and this will take place from Wednesday 27<sup>th</sup> January to Friday 29<sup>th</sup> January 2016. **Kindergarten will begin school on Monday 1<sup>st</sup> February (8:45-1:25); then full days from Monday 8<sup>th</sup> February (8:45-2:55).** 

### **WORLD YOUTH DAY RAFFLE TICKETS**

Catholic Diocese of Parramatta is fundraising for World Youth Day 2016. **Raffle tickets** have been sent home. There are great prizes on offer including a car. Raffle tickets are \$2 per ticket or \$20 per book. All monies raised from selling these raffle tickets will go directly to sending our Year 6 teacher, Ms Reynolds as a pilgrim to World Youth Day (Krakow, Poland) via the Philippines.

### **SWIMMING CARNIVAL**

This year we will be holding our Swimming Carnival to select the Our Lady of the Way representative team for 2016 at the end of this term to avoid the beginning school rush. The Carnival will be held on **Wednesday 9<sup>th</sup> December** at Glenbrook Pool, Wascoe St. Glenbrook.



- All children will compete in the novelty events with their grade.
- Children will compete in the 50m Freestyle events in the age they turn in 2016.
- All other 50m events are grouped as Junior (8-10 years), 11 years and 12 years.
- The 25m events are for those children who are unable to swim 50m. It is important that all swimmers are given a fair and equal chance to compete. 25m events will be held at the same time as the 50m events
- The 25m events will be freestyle and freestroke of the swimmers choice.
- Swim club times for the 200m I.M. need to be given to Mrs McKeon prior to the carnival.
- The carnival program indicating each student's events will be posted outside Year 6 prior to the carnival. This will
  indicate the competitors for all 100m, 50m and 25m events. Any changes to these events need to be given to Mrs.
  McKeon upon arrival at the pool.
- The current Year 6 students will be assisting on the day and will participate in the novelties and Year 6 grade races.

If your child is in Year 1 and is turning 8 years old next year they are entitled to try out for the zone swimming for 2016. Your child must be a competent swimmer who is easily able to swim at least 50m.

In order to place your child in their correct events please complete the entry form that was sent home this week. For this event to be a success we need as many parent helpers as possible. If you are able to assist at the carnival, please indicate this on your child's entry form.

This will be a wonderful community day for the end of the year.

The entry form needs to be returned to your child's classroom teacher by Tuesday 24th November. The cost for the Swimming Carnival will be included in the General Activities Fee. A separate note regarding transport home from the carnival will be sent home prior to the carnival.


The owners of the property are anxious that these elderly residents will venture out while the cars are turning around and may get seriously injured.

- 1. Respect and validate your child's feelings! Anxiety is a real emotion and not pleasant.
- 2. Teach your child deep, slow, belly breathing. This is an easy and very portable skill for self-soothing and calming.
  - 3. Listen to your child and ask "Tell me what you are thinking?" This will help to reveal scary thoughts and scenes that build up in your child's mind.
  - 4. Rather than swooping to reassure, ask your child "How likely is (that thing you're afraid of) to happen?" You'll be teaching him to challenge his anxious thinking.
- 5. Prompt your child with "Tell me some things you can do to handle this situation" and help her to brainstorm, rather than just giving her solutions. She'll feel empowered.
- 6. Give up the idea of "mental health days" "skip days" "sleep with mom nights" or other ways of avoiding feared situations. This just makes the anxiety stick more firmly and lead to further avoidance.
  - 7. Encourage your child's attempts to be brave, no matter how small they may seem to you. Use labeled praise such as "I'm so proud of you for sleeping in your own bed last night!"
  - 8. Work with your child to outline small steps leading to a bigger goal.
  - 9. Create opportunities for your child to practice being brave and coping, and then high-five his/her efforts!
  - 10. Recognize when you are anxious and say aloud what you can do to calm down and solve the situation. You'll be modeling coping for your child, but be mindful and don't overshare your anxiety!

### **Remembrance Day**



Yesterday we gathered as a school community to acknowledge Remembrance Day. The children shared the significance of the day, a reading from St. John's Gospel and the symbolism of poppies and rosemary. The focus of our ceremony was to name all those people who have been remembered by their families on our school Remembrance Wall. We further acknowledged them through the reciting of the ode, the playing of the last post and a minute's silence. The children were so respectful and very mindful of the significance of the ceremony.

### Jump Up & Down 4 Kids



Currently there are over 200 children in detention on Nauru calling for our help and pity.

Jump Up & Down 4 Kids because no child belongs in immigration detention.

The Human Rights Commission's Forgotten Children report into children in detention provides evidence that is both shocking and shameful.

The reporting has been consistent. Children are being harmed and the trauma they are experiencing may be carried well into their adult life.

Surely most decent adults would step in and not let this happen to any child in pain?

Tomorrow at Our Lady of the Way all the children will be taking part in a Diocesan wide initiative to "Jump Up and Down 4 Kids" living in detention.

At 12 o'clock, after the Angelus, the children will listen to the theme song and jump up and down to say they don't want to stand by and let children be affected by the trauma of living in detention. They don't belong there. They never did. We don't want to be blind to their misery.

# **GENERAL NEWS**



### **CHRISTMAS CHOIR**

The children of Our Lady of the Way have been invited to join the Christmas Vigil Mass Choir. Practise will commence on Tuesday 8<sup>th</sup> December at 6.30pm in the Church. Parents are also invited to join the choir.

### **CHANGE TO BUS PASSES**

From Term 1, 2016 paper bus passes will be replaced by the new School Opal card. As with the current School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) students will be eligible for free travel as follows: Years K-2 (Infants) – no minimum distance from their school; Years 3-6 (Primary) – 1.6km straight line distance or 2.3km walking distance or further from school. Applications can be made via a **new online application process**.

Many students with a current SSTS pass won't need to reapply, as a new pass will be issued automatically. This will be either a School Opal card or a school travel pass if the student needs to travel outside the Opal network to get to school.

However, you will need to complete an application form if:

- applying for SSTS for the first time
- enrolling in kindergarten
- progressing from year 2 to year 3
- progressing from year 6 to year 7
- changing name, school and/or address
- requesting a new additional pass as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation.

If a student doesn't qualify for a free travel pass, they may be eligible for a Term Bus Pass which offers travel on buses between home and school at a discounted rate for the whole school term.


Application for 2016 School Opal Cards and SSTS passes starts from Monday 2 November.

# 2016 Diocesan School Fees

Dear families

As you may be aware, there is still uncertainty around long term government funding for Catholic schools. Indications are that federal government funding for education post 2017 will be linked to the Consumer Price Index (CPI), which historically has been much lower than the education inflation rate. Funding growth linked to CPI will not meet increases in the real costs of schooling.

To maintain our current service levels we will need to increase diocesan tuition fees by 5%. This increase will mean we can continue to fund important initiatives to improve student learning, including:

- literacy and numeracy programs such as Focus160, Reading Recovery, EMU, EM4 and professional learning for teachers and leaders to support the implementation of these programs
- increasing support for students with disabilities, behavioural and emotional needs
- improving our learning spaces, technology and infrastructure
- building new schools and expanding existing schools to cater for new places

### Scholarships and fee arrangements

We are committed to ensuring that no child will be refused enrolment due to a family's financial situation. There are a range of scholarship and support programs to assist families including:

- The Bishop Manning Scholarship Fund
- Fee arrangements and discounts
- The Byallawa co-contribution scheme for Indigenous families

#### Annual Diocesan Tuition Fees - 2016

Annual Diocesan Tuition Fee can be paid upfront at the start of the year or as three equal payments in Terms 1, 2 and 3. Flexible payment plans are also available around weekly, fortnightly or monthly payments. The fee is only charged for the first three children currently enrolled in the diocese. There is no additional Diocesan Tuition Fee for the fourth child attending a systemic school in the diocese or other participating Catholic schools.

### Annual Diocesan Building Levy - 2016

The Diocesan Building Levy enables us to continue to maintain all schools to a high standard, and ensure we can expand or build new schools in high growth areas. To ensure this continues we will need to increase the building levy by \$33 per family per year. The levy for 2016 will be \$735 per family, payable in three equal instalments of \$245 in Terms 1, 2 and 3.

We continue to make every effort to contain educational costs and we do not take the decision to raise fees lightly. If a school fee increase will be difficult for your family to manage, please contact your school principal. We will provide every assistance to families in financial need.

Thank you for your ongoing support of Catholic education.
