Holy Week - March 28 - April 3, 2021

Holy Week is the week before Easter Sunday, beginning seven days before with Palm Sunday. It ends with Holy Saturday. Easter is not part of Holy Week, but rather the beginning of the Easter season of the Liturgical year. Holy Week.

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday. On this day, we celebrate the triumphant entry of Our Lord, Jesus Christ, into Jerusalem, riding a donkey. On that day, the people laid palms before Him, a gesture reserved for triumphant leaders. We celebrate this at Mass by distributing palms to the faithful who may keep them for a time for use as devotional objects. The palms are blessed at Mass. The faithful sometimes craft portions of palm fronds into crosses. Eventually, these palms are returned to the Church where they are burned. Traditionally, their ashes are saved and distributed at next year's Ash Wednesday services.

Later, when Jesus entered the Temple, he angrily drove out the money changers who had turned the Temple court into a place of business instead of devotion. Once the court was cleared, Jesus began teaching the masses. Meanwhile, His enemies drew plans to kill Him.

The next major event in Holy Week is Holy Thursday. On this day, Jesus celebrated the Passover feast with the disciples. We know this feast as the Last Supper. This is the night He was betrayed by Judas and arrested.

The Last Supper is celebrated at every Mass, and especially on Holy Thursday.

After supper, Jesus went to the Mount of Olives and prayed. From this event comes inspiration for our practice of Perpetual Eucharistic Adoration, where we are invited to spend one hour in prayer with Jesus, truly present in the Eucharist; Body, Blood, and Divinity.

Jesus was arrested on the night of Holy Thursday.

The next day is Good Friday, and on this day, we commemorate the trial, punishment, and crucifixion of Our Lord.

On that morning, Jesus was brought before Annas, a powerful Jewish cleric who condemned Jesus for blasphemy. From there, Jesus was presented to Pilate for trial. Although Pilate found no guilt in Jesus, he agreed to have him crucified to appease the crowd of people and prevent a riot.

Christ was stripped, flogged, and crowned with thorns. He was then forced to carry His Cross to the place of His execution. There, He was nailed to the Cross between two thieves who were likewise crucified. Late that afternoon, seeking to ensure Christ's death, a Roman guard stabbed him in his side with a spear. When Jesus died, an earthquake is said to have occurred as well as a great darkness which covered the land. Suddenly, many people knew Jesus was the Son of God.

Jesus was taken and laid quickly in a borrowed tomb, in accord with Jewish law, which required the dead be buried by sundown before the Sabbath.

In our churches, the Tabernacle is left empty, to show that Christ is departed.

On Holy Saturday, there is no Mass. Parishes may hold services, but there is no distribution of Communion.

On Holy Saturday, we remember that Jesus was descended into hell where He preached the Gospel to those who died before and opened the way to heaven for all those who were worthy.

This concludes Holy Week. The following day is Easter Sunday, the day on which it was discovered the Tomb was empty, and our Lord was resurrected, triumphing over death once and for all time.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION NEWS

The teachers and students of Our Lady of the Way have put together a reflection of the seven most significant moments in the last week of the life of Jesus. They are displayed on the fence which runs alongside our netball court. If you are not able to visit our 'Stations of the Cross', below are the QR codes that will link you to the videos that were created by each class and a short reflection/ prayer that you might join in as a family. The images that we have chosen for each station is a piece of indigenous artwork to make connection with our First Nation people.

Station 1: Palm Sunday (Kindergarten)



Reflection:

The symbol of this day is the palm. When you think of these symbols of love and hate, think about your own relationships. Can you sometimes be fickle; loving one moment, and not the next? Jesus, the King, invites each one of us to faithfully follow Him.

Prayer:

Dear God, as we celebrate Palm Sunday help us to remember that day when all the adults and children waved palm branches and cheered as Jesus entered Jerusalem as King. We know Jesus rose from the dead and is alive. Help us to remember that he is our wonderful King and that we can praise him everyday! In Jesus' name. Amen.

Station 2: The Washing of the Feet (Year 1)



Action:

As Jesus washed his disciples feet he showed them an example of how we should serve others. He told the disciples they should go and do the same. Jesus also encourages us to serve others.

As a symbol of washing each others feet, make the sign of the cross on the hand of the person next to you.

Prayer:

Jesus help us to understand what you have done. Help us to love as you do, to serve others and care for them as you did. Amen.

Station 3: The Last Supper (Year 2)




Prayer:

Jesus you give yourself to us as Bread and Wine because you love us and want to be with us always. Help us to remember your love and to share your love with those who are sad and in need. Help us Jesus to love as you love.

Action:

Let us pray the Lord's prayer together...



Station 4: In the Garden of Gethsemane (Year 3)



Reflection:

All of us need help sometimes. Just before he was arrested, when Jesus was in the Garden of Gethsemane, he turned to His Father for help.

What do you need help with?

Prayer:

As we remember Jesus' suffering and His love for our world, let us pray for all who suffer pain like Jesus did...(Pause)

Those who suffer from war and violence...(Pause)

Those who are hungry, poor and lonely...(Pause)

Those who are not treated fairly and are without love...(Pause)

Those whom we love who are hurting and sad...(Pause)



Help us Jesus to share your life with others. Amen.



Station 5: Jesus is Condemned to Death (Year 4)



Reflection:

Jesus, you stand alone before Pilate. No one speaks up for you. No one helps defend you. All your life you helped others, listened to them, cared for those who were poor and excluded. They don't seem to remember that as they prepare to put you to death.

Prayer:

Jesus, it is hard to imagine how you stayed quiet when so many people wanted to hurt you. Be with me when I feel afraid. Remind me to trust in God's love for me.

Jesus, give me the strength and courage that I need to stand up for those who are treated unfairly and unjustly. Help me pray for those who have hurt me.

Station 6: Jesus Carries His Cross (Year 5)



Reflection:

Jesus, as you accepted your cross, you knew you would carry it to your death on Calvary. You knew it wouldn't be easy, but you accepted it and carried it just the same.

Sometimes I don't like the problems that come my way. Sometimes I try to get others to take care of them or solve them for me. Sometimes I become upset when I'm asked to do even the smallest thing to help others.



Prayer:

Almighty Father, Jesus carried His cross without complaint. When I am tempted to complain, help me to remember Jesus and the cross he carried for me. Give me the courage and the strength that I need to be brave.

Station 7: The Crucifixion (Year 6)



Reflection:

You are stretched out on the cross you have carried so far. The soldiers take big nails and drive them into your hands and feet. You feel abandoned by the people you loved so much. You have done nothing but good, yet they treat you so cruelly.

As a child, sometimes I hurt others. Sometimes I join with friends and decide not to like another. We gang up against another and cause them hurt and pain. Sometimes I say or do hurtful things to my brothers and sisters.



Prayer:

Jesus, I can't imagine the agony of having nails driven through my hands and feet. Yet, in the midst of your pain you forgave those who did this terrible deed. Grant me the courage to forgive when I am wounded by others.

MATHEMATICS


Students have been exploring rich mathematical tasks using the following instructional model of student-centred inquiry learning experiences.



- 1. Teachers Anticipate the lesson and student responses
- 2. Teachers Launch the lesson
- 3. Students Explore
- 4. Teachers and Students Summarise / Review
- 5. Teachers Re-launch
- 6. Students Re-explore
- 7. Teachers and Students Re-summarise / Re-review

To be successful, students are asked the following in all learning experiences:

- to solve the problem in more than one way,
- to explain and record their thinking,
- to describe what is the same or different.



PBS4L

During Term One we have had the opportunity to revisit our Agreements and Expectations related to our PBS4L framework. PBS4L stands for Positive Behaviour Support for Learning and helps all members of our community know and understand how we can "Live Respectfully", "Act Responsibly" and 'Learn Together.

The top section of the table below unpacks our school agreements and the behaviours we expect in all settings. The bottom section unpacks our expectations in other areas at school. Students have been engaged in lessons to help develop consistency in the way and the behaviours have been reinforced with lots of 'free and frequent' feedback.

A challenge for everyone during the holidays might be to think about the agreements that your family likes to operate by and consider unpacking what the behaviours might look like in your setting.



At OLOW we have been using a data platform called Compass to record our student data. In Term 2 the parent portal on Compass will be opened for parents to access.

Why the move to Compass?

Compass is a platform implemented by CEDP for all schools in the diocese and is in the process of moving all data to this platform. By moving to Compass it allows us to have all our data and communication on one platform.

What does this mean?

This means that all communication for parents will be through Compass which means we will move away from using the skoolbag app for sharing information.

What will I be able to access?

Through compass you will have access to the following:

- -All newsletters, any other notes or messages that would have usually been sent out on skoolbag.
- -Alerts of absences so you can complete an absent note on Compass.
- -School reports. This means school reports will no longer be printed out and sent home, they will be accessed via Compass.
- -Booking interviews for such things as Parent/Student/Teacher conferences, MAI testing.

When will this happen?

We are in the process of having the parent portal set up and will keep you updated as we move closer to the portal being opened in Term 2. We will allow for a transition period from Skoolbag to Compass (this means communication will be on both platforms for a short period of time)

How will I access Compass?

Each family will receive login details and once you have logged in you will be able to see details regarding your child/ren.

We will keep you updated as we move forward to the use of the Parent Portal on Compass.
