# Principal's Message



# 2022 Focus Areas and Goals for Our Lady of the Way, Emu Plains

Welcome to a new academic year. I trust that you and your family have established routines for the year and have had an enjoyable start to the school year.

We particularly extend a warm welcome to our new kindergarten children and families new to our community. We also welcome our new staff members: Mrs Jessica Love (Year 1) and Mr Jacob Jenkins (Year 5), We are a "can do" community and I'm sure all will experience the spirit of inclusion and love of learning that the Our Lady of the Way provides.

On the last day of school in 2021, Linda Flanagan was successful in being appointed to the position of Teaching Educator - Extending Mathematical Understanding Professional Learning Leader. This is exciting work that will further support the mathematical development of our students across the Diocese.

Due to the late appointment and to support OLOW Primary School, CEDP has worked in partnership to provide a transition time over the first half of the year before Linda moves full-time into her role. This will mean that Linda will mostly be based at OLOW to ensure a smooth handover is completed with staff, students, and our parent community during Term 1 and part of Term 2. Another part of Linda's new role in maintaining her accreditation as a Specialist EMU teacher is the facilitation of an EMU intervention group. This will be run daily at OLOW.

Linda is most appreciative of the relationships that she has developed with the OLOW community and cherishes the beautiful students and staff that she has worked with over time.

## 2022 Focus Areas and Goals

I would like to share with everyone our focus areas for 2022. Some, you may notice, begin to happen very early this term, others will become more evident as the year progresses.

Our overarching theme is for all learners to experience the "Will, Thrill and Skill" of learning. Student engagement is an essential component of the learning cycle. We need to find "the hook" for each student. We will continue to focus considerable teacher training in the area of social and emotional wellbeing and ensure that this is a significant focus when covering the PDHPE syllabus and using our PBS4L Framework.

During the first few weeks of this term we have focused, in all classes, on our school agreements and expectations.

We have reflected on the feedback from our recent "Tell them from me" survey and have introduced a school wide process of sharing work samples with you from all Key Learning Areas. The work sample will show the task, the learning intention and success criteria for the lesson. Your child will reflect on their learning experience and there will also be an opportunity for you to give feedback on the task. The schedule for Semester 1 will be as follows:




There is also going to be an opportunity to talk with your child's class teacher about your goals for your child and for you to share information that you feel that is important for the teaching team to know. This is a listening conference for the teacher. They will keep a record of your feedback so that they can adapt the curriculum to meet your child's specific needs as a learner. There will be further communication coming home via Compass. In addition to this, the regular Semester 1 and Semester 2 reports will also be shared.

Our Lady of the Way plans to continue our focus on improving writing K-6. It is our intention to explicitly teach the writing processes (planning, drafting, editing, proofreading, publishing) to improve their authorial and secretarial skills. There will be an explicit focus on spelling.

There will be a focus on the pedagogy of teaching Mathematic via the use of an instructional model of studentcentred structured inquiry learning experiences. Lessons are developed using the structure of Launch, Explore, Summarise/Review. These lessons take 60 minutes and the cycle could be completed twice in a given lesson or there could be a follow up lesson following the same model.

The focus of our professional learning agenda for staff reflects the goals presented above. Professional development can take many forms. We gather each week on a Wednesday afternoon. We release staff to attend cohort specific small group workshops. Teachers may also complete online learning courses or attend conferences. We are fortunate to have Lead Teachers and Teacher Educators from the diocese that meet with us regularly to be a critical friend and help us reflect on our programs and make changes in order to improve the learning opportunities of our students. We also are part of research projects that enable us to work with both national and international universities and experts in the field. Currently we are involved with Monash University via the EMC3 Mathematics Project.

We look forward to working in partnership with you this year as together we ignite the flame for each child. We want each learner in our community to experience the "Will, Thrill and Skill" of learning.

During the first few weeks of each year, students are actively engaged in lessons and activities that define our school agreements and encourage expected behaviours. Teachers will offer tokens when they see expected behaviours. Tokens are then added to the class token container, leading towards a whole class reward.

We encourage you to ask your children, "Did you receive a token today?" and finding out what it was for. This dialogue will help reinforce the expected behaviours and develop the intrinsic motivation for your children to continue showing these behaviours.
