Parent Communication Term 1 Week 9

PRINCIPAL

Last week we held our first Parents and Friends meeting for 2023. I want to thank the parents who found the time to attend the meeting and provided their ideas to make OLOW a better place for our students. The P & F voted in a new committee and attended to a number of initiatives including fundraising. Other issues raised included options for a canteen and proposed changes to student uniforms. I appreciate that both of these issues are important to the broader community, but there is a process for investigating and then implementing these changes. There are no short fixes to either of these issues.

CANTEEN

An initial inquiry by the school has determined the following.

- The option of finding an external company to operate the canteen via a tender process will
 not be pursued. This has been previously attempted without success. Due to the size of the
 school and financial accountabilities of running a business, our canteen is not a viable option
 for a small business operator.
- The P&F wanted to pursue the option of a parent run canteen. Upon investigation with Catholic Schools Parramatta Diocese (CSPD) we have been advised that this is not option. CSPD have provided the following reasons, regulatory requirements, including the need for an ABN, Workers Compensation Insurance, Public Liability, Child Protection challenges and the need to enter a contractual arrangement with the parish to pay rent for using the site.

Obviously, this is disappointing news for the school community. To be clear as Principal, I value an operational canteen, but this is a CSPD decision.

As a way forward, we are investigating alternative options for lunch orders. We are investigating providers who would be able to provide a more regular service with improved food options.

UNIFORM

Potential changes to student uniforms were raised as an ongoing discussion point. We have conducted initial inquiries and determined that although this is possible any changes would need to go through an extensive approval process and then meet our contractual agreements with Lowes. There is also a need to ensure current stock levels are sold to families before any changes to stock can occur at Lowes. This means a change would be a long-term prospect with a phased in period.

NAPLAN

Last week students in Years 3 and 5 completed their NAPLAN assessment. I want to acknowledge the students' efforts in completing the assessments and their parents and staff who did a great job of preparing them for the test.

NAPLAN is one assessment used to monitor student progress. Its power is in making comparisons as a student progresses through school and ensuring student progress is being maintained. In many ways it is affirming assessment that supports what the school already knows about each student. Results of the assessment are not due for some time and will be sent to parents as soon as they are received. In previous years this occurred in August or September.



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SPECIALIST PROGRAMS AT OUR LADY OF THE WAY

All teachers are entitled to a set amount of Release From Face to Face Teaching (RFF). The amount of time is stipulated in the Teachers Enterprise Agreement and is currently fixed at two hours per week for full time teachers and pro rata for part time teachers. Those following the current enterprise negotiations would be aware that teachers are asking for this time to be increased in acknowledgment of the growing demands placed on teachers.

At Our Lady of the Way this time is provided to teachers through specialist programs including;

- The Strings is a Two-Year Program starting in Year 3
- Music Program for Kinder, Years 1, 2, 5 and 6
- Indigenous Immersion Program K-6
- Visual Arts Program for Years 4, 5, 6

INDIGENOUS IMMERSION

Our Indigenous Immersion Program replaced the former Japanese Languages Program. This occurred late in 2022 when the current Languages teacher left OLOW. A recruiting process was run to try to employ a new languages teacher without success. As many of you would be aware there is a shortage of teachers in NSW, and this is impacting schools' ability to resource programs. Mrs Graham was employed under advice from myself as she worked with me at my previous school running the Indigenous Immersion Program.

The Indigenous Immersion Program involves planned and structured lessons like any other Key Learning Area. Students are assessed and therefore it will be included in Student Progress Reports.

Indigenous Immersion lessons will involve the learning of Aboriginal history, culture and language to engage all students in reconciliation, respect, and recognition of the world's oldest continuous living culture.

Students learn about linguistic features and structures of the local Dharug language oral and written. This provides a unique opportunity to learn about and extend respect to Aboriginal Languages and cultures.

THE CREATIVE ARTS PROGRAM

Students in years Four, Five and Six attend a weekly creative arts lesson. This term the focus has been Visual Arts

- In Years 5 and 6 Australian and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists have been the stimulus for learning activities. Students have been exploring the relationship between artist and subject matter and particularly, the cultural significance of art for indigenous communities. Students have been thinking about their own artistic intentions as they produce art. They have used a range of forms and techniques including sketching, etchings and paintings with mediums such as chalk, charcoal, acrylic paint, watercolour paint and ochre.
- Year 4's Visual Arts program focus subject matter has been exploring a variety of landforms affected by weathering and erosion.



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STRINGS PROGRAM

The strings program is a classroom-based program in which the students learn one of the 4 stringed instruments - Violin, Viola, Cello or Double Bass over a 2-year period starting in year 3. It is codelivered by the school music teacher and a string specialist tutor. In year 4 the students are allocated an instrument to take home to further their learning.

CAPTIVATE also offers a small group lesson program for students who wish to continue learning the instrument at the end of the program.



MUSIC PROGRAM

Students from Early Stage One, Years One, Two, Five and Six attend a weekly music lesson. Years Three and Four do not complete this component as they attend the Strings Program.

The lesson aims to have:

Children actively participate in a variety of games and songs, exploring elements of pitch and rhythm. The program is based on the principles of Zoltan Kodaly.

Through singing, games, fun and play, the child discovers the musical elements, as they are presented sequentially and have the opportunity to enter the world of music through the creative development of the ear and eye.



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


Children will develop their sense of pitch.

- By imitating, reading hand signs, each year increasing the range of notes. (CA, CD, CDA....)
- By developing singing and playing skills, through echo singing, then playing known patterns on instruments (keyboards, recorders. xylophones)
- By developing listening skills and visual memory children will transfer from hand signs to graphic notation, then standard notation.

Children also develop auditory memory and rhythm through clapping patterns with rhymes, echo patterns. Children can maintain the beat, while singing a song, moving to the beat in games. Children can express themselves through responding to sound, rhythm by singing or playing the answer to a question.

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


Welcome To Year 2!


In Year 2 we have been super busy! We wanted to share with you the awesome work our students have created.

Year 2 has also been reading information text about the sun (The Sun is Kind of a Big Deal) during shared reading and writing an information report about the sun.









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






Mathematics
