



INFECTIOUS DISEASES PROCEDURES

Updated 2023

1.0 Rationale

At Our Lady of the Way School, we believe that:

- Infectious diseases can spread rapidly with the classroom and wider school community. Although many diseases pose minimal risk to healthy individuals, some may have adverse and long-term effects on health if undetected or untreated. Some individuals may also have susceptibility to, or risk associated with certain diseases, for example, children with suppressed immunity, students not immunised and pregnant women.
- Our school has a duty of care to provide and maintain a healthy and safe environment for all staff, students and others working at or visiting the school and to minimise the risk of anyone in the school community contracting and infectious disease.

2.0 Immunisation Records & Enrolment

- 2.1 Prioritisation of enrolments as outlined in the CSPD enrolment policy and procedures are applied regardless of a child's immunisation status.
- 2.2 Children being enrolled at *Our Lady of the Way School* must provide an immunisation certificate. This certificate must be kept in safe custody at the school and be produced on request by a health official.
- 2.3 The principal must, on being asked to do so by a parent of the child or the principal of another school, forward the certificate to the principal of the other school.
- 2.4 Children without immunisation certificates are classed 'at risk' under the Public Health Act. These children may be asked to stay at home by the principal or delegate during an outbreak of a vaccine preventable disease.
- 2.5 The exclusion of infectious children or staff is a major method of preventing the spread of infection in a school. NSW Health requires a person with certain infectious diseases to be excluded from school. The minimum period of absence varies according to the sickness, and onset of the symptoms.

3.0 Procedures - Outbreaks of Infectious Diseases

- 3.1 The Principal or delegate will notify the local Public Health Unit as soon as possible after they are made aware that a child enrolled at the school is suffering from one of the following vaccine-preventable diseases:
 - 1. Diphtheria
 - 2. Mumps
 - 3. Poliomyelitis
 - 4. Haemophilus Influenza Type B (Hib)
 - 5. Meningococcal disease
 - 6. Rubella (German Measles)
 - 7. Measles
 - 8. Pertussis (Whooping Cough)
 - 9. Tetanus
- 3.2 Parents of children, who are not vaccinated, are notified and may be excluded from school for their own protection, if class members or staff are diagnosed with either vaccine preventable or highly infectious diseases. The Principal or delegate must consult the Public Health Unit for advice on this matter.
- 3.3 The Principal or delegate will notify the school community of the outbreak of any highly infectious diseases (see Appendix 1) or those diseases which have particularly adverse effects on highly susceptible individuals.
- 3.4 Where there is an outbreak of any highly infectious or vaccine preventable disease and a staff member is pregnant, or is not vaccinated against a vaccine preventable disease and the staff member presents a medical certificate stating they are 'at risk', a risk assessment is conducted around the appropriate course of action in consultation with CSPD.
- 3.5 In case of an outbreak of either vaccine preventable or highly infectious diseases, *Our Lady of the Way School* will:
 - Contact their local Public Health Unit on 1300 066 055 for advice
 - I If applicable, provide a factsheet for all families in the affected class.
 - Inform and distribute the information to all staff members on the same day as notification.
 - Notify all parents of the outbreak via the next weekly newsletter or send home a notice outlining the outbreak.
- 3.6 Parent/Carers are required to:
 - Inform the school immediately if their child is diagnosed with any of the diseases listed in Appendix 1, or have had contact with an infected person.
 - Comply with any recommended periods of exclusion as determined by the Principal or delegate in consultation with the Public Health Unit.
 - Provide a current immunisation certificate as to the immunisation history of the child if possible.
- 3.7 Staff are required to:
 - Inform the Principal or delegate immediately if notified by a parent/Carer that a child has been diagnosed with any disease listed in Appendix 1.
 - Inform the Principal or delegate immediately if the staff member is diagnosed with a disease listed in Appendix 1.
 - Distribute any notification information provided by the school, on the same day as received.

LIST OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES

Vaccine preventable diseases

The following diseases are listed as vaccine preventable diseases in Schedule 3 of the *Public Health Act 2010* (NSW):

Diphtheria	Pertussis ("whooping cough")
Haemophilus influenza Type B (Hib)	Poliomyelitis
Measles	Rubella ("German measles")
Meningococcal disease	Tetanus

Infectious diseases of childhood

Children are at increased risk of some infectious diseases because they have not yet developed immunity to them, they tend to gather in groups, and they may have difficulty with some aspects of hygiene.

NSW Health lists the following as infectious diseases of childhood:
